



More than **22 million guests** have visited Georgia Aquarium since it opened in **2005**.

Each minute, the Aquarium's life support system filters more than **170,000 gallons** of water.



At opening, the **Guinness Book of World Records** certified Georgia Aquarium as having more aquatic life than any other aquarium at the time.



Guests from all **50 states** and **143 countries** on **six continents** have visited the Aquarium.



One-and-a-half White Houses could fit into the 84,000 square-foot AT&T Dolphin Tales gallery, and the theater's impressive viewing window is the length of **two school buses**.



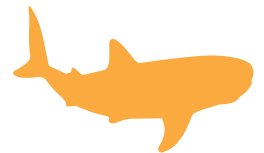
Georgia Aquarium has **reduced water usage by about 24%** through a combination of condensation recaptured from our cooling units, waterless urinals and operational improvements to our life support systems.

Our volunteers serve **9,000 - 13,000 hours** a month and have volunteered more than **1.6 million hours** since the Aquarium opened.



Georgia Aquarium is one of the world's largest aquariums, with more than **10 million gallons** of water in more than **100 habitats** and one of the most abundant collections of aquatic life anywhere.

Collectively, the four whale sharks at Georgia Aquarium eat more than **47,000 pounds** of food each year.



Each year, the Georgia Aquarium commissary prepares more than **500,000 pounds** of food for our animals.



Tropical Diver's Pacific barrier reef habitat is one of the largest living reef exhibits in the United States, at about **164,000 gallons**.



Since opening, members of the Aquarium's research team have participated in nearly **100 funded research projects** and served as authors on more than **130 peer-reviewed publications and conference appearances**.



Georgia Aquarium is the only aquarium in North America that is home to **manta rays** and **whale sharks**, the largest fish in the world.
